FORM Dance Projects respectfully acknowledges the Traditional Custodians of the land on which we work and dance: The Burramattagal people and clans of the Dharug Nation. We pay our respects to Dharug Elders past, present and emerging. We celebrate the continuing culture of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders and extend our respect to all First Nations people.

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Emerging 23 years ago through a Create NSW and City of Parramatta community outreach initiative, FORM has grown into a vital arts organisation firmly anchored in Western Sydney. Uniquely placed in the Australian independent dance sector as both presenter and producer, FORM drives an artistic program engaging a community of local, national and international dance artists.

Our purpose is to rigorously support independent Australian dance artists and develop audiences for contemporary dance. FORM exists to provide opportunities for Australian independent dance artists to create, experiment, present new work and connect with audiences. We support artists at all stages of their career, develop their national and international profiles and provide valuable professional development opportunities.

FORM's vision is ambitious. In Parramatta, rapidly transforming into Sydney's central city, we work in an environment reflective of a future Australia. Alongside independent dance artists, we embrace the diversity of young Western Sydney dancers from many cultural communities to challenge the face of Australian contemporary dance. We build on our expertise in the contemporary dance sector and offer something new to artists and audiences.

FORM's program spans four key areas presentation and producing, education, community engagement and audience development. The interconnectedness of these activities is vital for wider understanding and appreciation of Australian dance culture in a shifting contemporary context. As one of the leading presenters of independent dance in Sydney and Australia, FORM is the place artists come to premiere new dance work and realise their artistic vision. Our signature

Dance Bites program is acclaimed for its eclectic curation, showcasing a wide range of choreographers working across diverse styles – from the innovative and experimental to the popular and accessible. The works of experienced, more established artists are placed alongside those of promising newcomers.

FORM takes risks. We commission and produce large innovative new Australian dance works, made in Parramatta, Western Sydney. In collaboration with diverse partner companies and leading Australian independent choreographers and artists, we extend professional development opportunities for mid-career to established artists to create and collaborate in the making of innovative new work.

FORM provides unique opportunities for young people in Western Sydney. We increase their exposure to renowned choreographic practice, contribute to artform appreciation and develop young audiences. We play an important role in fostering the next generation of dance makers. Through our enlivening education program, we provide access and participation in dance culture for earlycareer artists and performing arts students. Underpinning the artistic program and as a companion to our Dance Bites program, the education program includes skills development, workshops, Q&A sessions and masterclasses. The annual Sharp Short Dance Festival for choreographers and dancers 21 and under offers young artists a unique opportunity to experience a presentation environment supported by industry peers.

FORM's partnerships are vital to our work. We have developed and maintained numerous relationships across industry sectors and across Western Sydney that

will continue to help us forge new ground and broaden opportunities for the dance sector. Our many successes over the last two decades demonstrate FORM is forging an exciting trajectory, based on unique initiatives and responses to the broader arts landscape.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

In the third year of COVID-related restrictions on how we live and work, I'd firstly like to thank FORM's dedicated team, who continued to successfully collaborate and support independent dance artists. While there have been important and positive learnings from this time, there is no doubt that the energy and commitment needed to deliver the FORM program within this every-changing environment has been substantial.

FORM Director, Annette McLernon; Business Manager, Sally Ebert; Program Manager, Agnes Michelet; Program Co-Ordinator, Naomi Hibberd and the 2022 program's many collaborators, have worked as a committed team to deliver exceptional outcomes. It is testament to what small-to-medium independent arts companies can deliver when they are nimble, adaptive and supported with the necessary funding. In 2022 this included the Commonwealth Government's Restart Investment to Sustain and Expand (RISE) Fund which allowed FORM to build digital capacity, and also develop and deliver *Kairos*, an important new work by Meryl Tankard.

In a year of constant evolution, it is perhaps fitting that the FORM Board also welcomed new members at the Annual General Meeting; including Dolla Merrillees, Martin del Amo and Pepa Molina along with recently appointed board members Jane Witter and myself. These new members joined our dedicated existing board members, Pam Thornton and Julie-Anne Long. I thank this remarkable collective, who bring a wealth of experience and capability from across the independent dance, arts and professional sectors.

I choose to support FORM because I know first-hand how important it is to experience performance that takes you out of your own world. As a misfit kid and teen, growing up in a then drab south-western Sydney, I remember the lasting effect of experiencing other people's stories told through dance and theatre. FORM works to deliver those experiences as both a presenter and producer for many independents artists, within, thankfully, a much-changed Western Sydney. Without FORM's support there would be a major gap in the dance community and communities more broadly in Sydney, and nationally.

Over 300 artists participate in our annual artistic program, and FORM forges important connections and outcomes for emerging and established dance artists. While FORM creates enormous impact, the precarious nature of our arts organisations means there is always a need to help sustain and grow that work.

We continue to work closely with Creative Partnerships Australia through their philanthropy campaign, Plus1 Program. This association raised funds for our annual Sharp Short Dance festival for young, emerging dance artists from Western Sydney and beyond and delivered An Evening with Meryl Tankard, an artist talk, that raised FORM's profile whilst promoting *Kairos*. Such support, which also dance in Australia. As leader, Annette has includes generous financial contribution from the Packer Family Foundation, works to ensure that future creatives continue to be nurtured. I encourage our supporters to support FORM in whatever way they can, so we can continue to contribute to Western Sydney's dynamic cultural landscape.

Particular thanks go to stakeholders at Create NSW and the City of Parramatta, who continue to support and contribute to FORM's yearly program. I would also like to thank Craig McMaster and his team at Riverside Theatres, and Olivia Ansell at Sydney Festival for their ongoing and committed partnership with FORM as a presenter of new Australian dance works.



Finally, and most importantly, I would like to give the board's heartfelt thanks to Annette McLernon, FORM's Director for the last 12 years. Annette resigned in late 2022 and will step-aside as Director in March 2023. During Annette's tenure FORM has transformed from a small service organisation into a leading presenter and producer of independent contemporary put FORM on the map. The organisation now plays a critical role in the Australian dance sector and offers significant support to a vast number of independent dancers, creatives, collectives, partners and emerging dance organisations in Western Sydney and beyond. We would like to thank Annette for her outstanding dedication to FORM and the Australian dance industry.

2023 will see us appoint a new leader who will develop our next strategic plan, built on Annette's impressive legacy. Stay in touch, as it promises to be an exciting time.

Successful RISE Federal arts funding was extremely impactful for our independent dance organisation in Western Sydney in 2022, as it steered us through the challenging pandemic. FORM flourished because of the productivity generated through project funding while we navigated the year, of what was referred to as, *"living with Covid."*

FORM was able to facilitate valuable employment, skills development, mentoring, creation, presentation and participation opportunities for the community of independent dance artists, including Western Sydney artists, we support.

Opening and closing the year, in January and December 2022, FORM commissioned and produced two creative developments of a new Australian dance work, *Kairos*, directed by legendary choreographer, Meryl Tankard AO, composed and performed by Elena Kats-Chernin AO, with visual artist Régis Lansac (OAM) collaborating with the next generation of Australian dance makers.

Across the year FORM employed 25 artists to create *Kairos*, and secured a Sydney Festival 2023 presentation for the World Premiere. After 2.5 years in the making, through the pandemic years, *Kairos* was emerging as a captivating and provocative, new Australian dance work. Meryl Tankard, as Director, highlighted and drew together the dance vocabulary and uniqueness of six independent dance artists, Taiga Kita-Leong, Cloé Fournier, Thuba Ndbali, Lillian Fournier, Julie Ann Minaai, and Jasmin Luna with a constellation of creative designers. Meryl said Kairos "exceeded her expectations", whilst Elena Kats-Chernin said she was "so grateful for FORM choosing her as the composer for this project, and for persevering against all obstacles!"

ENCOUNTER SYDNEY was produced by FORM and presented by Sydney Opera House with Emma Saunders, director and the WE ARE HERE Company dancers on the forecourt of Sydney Opera House in May 2022. Warren Foster, the spoken word poet collaborated with Western Sydney writer, Felicity Castagna, creating a fresh Sydney text for this mini-version of the original Parramatta, Western Sydney production, presented in Sydney Festival 2020. FORM also had the opportunity to produce in partnership with Sydney Youth Orchestras an invaluable recording of the original *ENCOUNTER* music scores, composed by Amanda Brown and Jodi Phillis, commissioned by FORM Dance Projects. It certainly was a celebration of tenacity and hope for the future, to see the dancers performing this Sydney version of *ENCOUNTER* on the majestic steps of the opera house.

Our signature Dance Bites 2022 program saw the emergence of premiere seasons of new dance works by independent dance makers, such as *Double Beat*, by Sara Black, that had gone into hiatus. Still amidst risks of cancellation due to COVD ongoing events, it was a relief to see this season presented at Riverside Theatres in May, after being postponed twice in 2020, then 2021. The all-female artistic team was exceptional and audiences responded very positively to the work, including dance school teachers and students. The season also saw the return of reviewers to the theatre. Radical Transparency, Emma Saunders with WE ARE HERE Company launched Dance Bites in March 2022. This was the company's first full-length main staged work. In collaboration with her team of 10 emerging dancers and professional creatives such as Felicity Castagna from ENCOUNTER, Emma Saunders created a very unique blend of written and spoken text, video, song and everyday movement. It was a proud achievement for this emerging Western Sydney dance company. The inimitable Ryuichi Fujimura (Fall! Falter!! Dance!!!) featured in a double bill season Let's DANCE with Chris Chua (BeatStorm) which was a critical success, and attracted younger participation and a more diverse audience. The final Dance Bites season, Bat Lake, welcomed the return of larger audiences in the theatre and was a tremendous achievement for Eliza Cooper as an emerging choreographer and the tight ensemble of independent dancers. The Learn the Repertoire See the Show sold out months in advance. The Dance Bites 2022 program highlighted the resilience and strong sense of community imbedded in the NSW independent dance sector has kept adapting to new circumstant capturing this year the opportunities offered through the addition of film

Throughout 2022 FORM invested in building the digital capacity for our organisation and training our small team in digital skills and producing digital content. FORM employed producers, dance artists, composers, designers, production crews, and theatre technicians. We provided opportunities for artists to participate in a variety of digital activities and events related to dance (podcasts, blogs, online dance workshops, streaming Dance Bites shows) and our annual online youth dance festival, Sharp Short Dance, which flipped to digital in 2021, became a hybrid digital/theatre presentation in 2022.

The annual youth dance festival, Sharp Short Dance, was creatively produced by Naomi Hibberd with MC Jamie Winbank. Young dance makers from Western Sydney and far beyond continued to embrace the online dance film section. Since 2020 Sharp Short Dance festival has kept adapting to new circumstances, capturing this year the opportunities offered through the addition of film, whilst reinforcing the live performance core of the festival, still affected by COVID. The dance film component of the festival continued in 2022 engaging entrants from Regional NSW to New York City. The final was presented live in the theatre and livestreamed.

It was heartening to have a new FORM board evolve in 2022 led by Mark Lillis as Chair. FORM simply wouldn't exist without the dedication and commitment from the board. Thank you from the FORM team, and all the artists, creatives and production crew that contribute to FORM collectively, and have benefited from the board's ongoing voluntary support.

After a rippin' world premiere of ENCOUNTER in 2020, in Parramatta, Western Sydney, FORM Dance Projects, Emma Saunders and a new dance ensemble, the WE ARE HERE Company, are back with ENCOUNTER SYDNEY. In this site-specific work of joy, spread out on the forecourt of Sydney Opera House, directed by the "formidable" Emma Saunders, ENCOUNTER SYDNEY explored the everyday extraordinariness and energy behind our next generation.

In collaboration with a group of awardwinning Australian artists, including writer, Felicity Castagna, composers, Amanda Brown (The Go-Betweens) and Jodi Phillis (The Clouds), a cast of 10 dancers and words spoken by Warren Foster, ENCOUNTER SYDNEY explored the indomitable spirit of youth and the world they find themselves in.

The riveting soundtrack to ENCOUNTER SYDNEY, is the original ENCOUNTER score performed and recorded by the musicians of the Western Sydney Youth Orchestra, conducted by James Pensini.

KAIROS – DEVELOPMENT

MERYL TANKARD AO | ELENA KATS-CHERNIN AO | REGIS LANSAC OAM COMMISSIONED AND PRODUCED BY FORM DANCE PROJECTS

JANUARY 2022 AND DECEMBER 2022

In ancient Greek, *Kairos* is "the right or opportune moment for doing, a moment that cannot be scheduled". That moment is now for director Meryl Tankard AO, composer Elena Kats-Chernin AO and visual artist Régis Lansac OAM, who have created a vibrant new dance work responding to these uncertain and challenging times.

Commissioned and produced by FORM Dance Projects and created by three worldrenowned Australian artists and long time collaborators, with the next generation of dance makers, this Sydney Festival world premiere will encompass a vast lexicon of human experience and human movement: the dark and challenging; the ugly and beautiful; the humorous and joyful.

These internationally celebrated artists collaborated with emerging to mid-career dance artists: Cloé Fournier, Katina Olsen, Thubalethu Ndibali, Taiga Kita-Leong, Jasmin Luna, Lillian Fearn and Julie Ann Minaai. As a director and choreographer Tankard is revered for her dynamic intuitive movement, challenging, encouraging and drawing out each performer's own vocabulary of movements.

Kairos speaks to these times, through the history of time. We experience our contemporary 21st century world collapsing and expanding through a concertina of disaster, crisis, chaos and suffering. All seen through the experience of a pandemic that has kept us isolated, and impacted the very essence of dance, the artform of touch.

This final creative development emerges from a choreographic intensive, *Masked*, commissioned and facilitated by FORM Dance Projects in 2020-2021, directed and mentored by Meryl Tankard, with 8 Australian independent dancemakers. These artists led an immersive residency at Bundanon, where they initiated the framework with the dance artists to create a series of individual solos or duets, at their most profound when presented together, in personal response to a painting by modernist painter Sidney Nolan, focusing on social and environmental issues. The natural bush environment on the banks of the Shoalhaven River at Bundanon, post 2020 bushfires, and some rare and radical spray painted portraits by Sidney Nolan from his little known Heads series in the 1980's, were an inspiration for Meryl and the artists.

Kairos, leaping from the foundations of *Masked*, sees selected artists solos and duets, further creatively developed and performed in a series, each piece held together and connected by an original contemporary piano score composed by Elena Kats-Chernin, and soundscape created by Bob Scott, in collaboration with Meryl Tankard.

With an exceptional all female Australian cast and creative team directed by Helpmann Award winner Sara Black, Double Beat explores the aural and physical responses the heart and pulse present in differing emotional and physical states. Written for three women, this contemporary dance trio takes the audience into a deep cocoon of meditation and rhythm.

Three weeks after conception we have a beat, our bodies are far from fully formed, yet a beat has begun. Altering in response to activity and emotion, it is a constant presence within us throughout life's journey, until it simply stops. We can often be disconnected to this life force and sensation that we carry within us. Here we find space to connect to those rhythms and observe the wonder of the human body.

BeatStorm is a collision between a video game and a movement performance. Motion capture devices track and project two players into a virtual world in real-time as they travel along a fast-moving path set to high-energy electronic dance music evocative of video gaming. In each level, players must dodge a barrage of obstacles and collect items by moving their bodies; there is a one-to-one correspondence of movement between the real and the virtual. Step was originally commissioned by Nick Power & Intimate Spectacle as a ten minute work for Out of Iso, in Nick's NEXT LEVEL: A new realm of hip hop, October 2020. A first creative development towards a larger work was supported by Sydney

Festival, and UNSW Creative Practice Laboratory. *Step* had its second creative development supported by FORM Dance Projects and Riverside Theatres at the Northmead Studio. During the 3 weeks residency at FORM, Molonai deepened the conceptual terrain of the work in a period of research and generation of new performance material. Working with artists Clive Ellwood (dancer/performer) and Russell Morell (drummer) and mentored by Latai Taumoepeau and Matt Prest. FORM Dance Projects annual youth dance festival featured short works by choreographers and dancers 21 and under. Sharp Short Dance inspires young performers to strive for their own artistic excellence and encourages active youth participation in all genres and traditions of dance and media. In 2022 the festival expanded with exciting dance film content and digital media. Sharp Short Dance is a Western Sydney-based event that celebrates young talent, with entries from across Australia, from local to regional and interstate. Sharp Short Dance Live featured 22 dance works created and performed by young dancers, up to 5 minutes in length. Entrants performed in a heat and a panel of industry professionals invited a selection of works to be presented in the final. Sharp Short Dance Film featured 20 dance films created by young dancers and choreographers. BLOGGER IN RESIDENCE VICKI VAN HOUT

In 2022, FORM Dance Projects commissioned Australia Council Dance Award (2019) recipient Vicki Van Hout to be the resident blogger after the ongoing success of her blog residency, initiated in 2013. Throughout the year Van Hout blogged for FORM about all things dance from her unique perspective as an Indigenous choreographer. Van Hout's blog contributes valuable reputable discourse within the dance community and is a perceptive, entertaining and articulate window to the dance world for a larger audience.

DANCING THE AGENCY OF THINGS BLOG 9 MAY 2022

I have found that the process of ageing has had a strange effect upon me, in that in my pursuit to thwart rigor mortis my dance has become loud and somewhat vulgar at times. Like a hot flush, I can feel when I transition from a sophisticate into a lunatic as I give in to the surge of mania, and my limbs cleave the space producing overly energetic lines and sequences, whereby only fools and unwitting audience members remain in close proximity. Martin del Amo in comparison always seems to move as if he's floating. Del Amo invokes a delicate air of curiosity, as if atmospheric currents are taking him on a journey belying his extensive experience in Body Weather training, which is geared towards honing sensitivity in relation to space and place. Despite our seeming incompatibility, I had the best time intuiting the porosity of the steel blades of samurai swords thousands of years old, refashioned and repurposed for a second life in WWII, to dancing the machinations of the artificial intelligence it took to uncover the age of a Persian rug and the composite construction of a frail wooden pony, amongst the many artefacts with del Amo. For our dance was as much about the discovery of aspects of each other as it was the objects; how to share the performative space and work in complement to each other as opposed to modes of combat, vying for the eyes and attention of the bystanding bodies.

BACK TO GARMA BLOG 4 AUGUST 2022

Back to Garma. As I tuned in, a bunngal (dance) session was underway with two clans performing flag dances. The flag dances are a part of a song cycle which chronicles the early interaction with Indonesian sailors fishing and bartering for trepang or sea slugs.

All of a sudden I saw two dances I haven't seen performed for a long time. Card dance and drinking dance. As an Aboriginal dance student from down south learning the dances for the first time I was embarrassed to perform the dances because we used to get a bad rap as drunks and the like. I suppose the audiences we were performing for wouldn't have known that the dances form embodied repositories of history which predates British colonial settlement, so the people teaching us those dances just left them out of the song cycle to avoid potential controversy. But to see the dances performed at Garma was heartening, proof that we are inhabiting a great time of change

By the way, I am writing to you from the lands of the Yugambeh people in Coolangatta as I am teaching some choreographic workshops as part of a Karul dance company intensive titled Ngari Ngali-Wahlu. Yesterday we learned dances from country all around this area on the Eastern seaboard of southern Queensland. One dance held within it the local knowledge of fishing practices. whereby if too many fish were caught they were given back to the sea for the dolphins to eat. This dance is vital and a symbol of the environmental zeitgeist as it typifies the kind of ecological management we are all aiming for in this precarious time of environmental fragility.

AN OCTOBER JAM-PACKED WITH EMBODIED REPRESENTATIONS **ON STAGE**

BLOG 7 NOVEMBER 2022

Bat Lake began with a stunning inverted solo whereby a compelling idiosyncratic language for busy hands, performed in a shoulder stand, was enacted and later replicated. The solo was curtailed all too soon to be replaced by a duet reminiscent of other reptiles, before the remainder of the ensemble cast joined the first two males

Cooper's choreography was enhanced by the costuming, also conceived by Cooper, consisting of voluminous layers of translucent black fabric which billowed and undulated, serving to obscure the increasing virtuosic shapes and lines within the sequences. I was simultaneously reminded of the ink blots used in old psychiatry tests whereby patients were asked to decipher the ambiguity created by their amorphous form, and the plumes of smoke utilised by magicians to hide the machinations of their chicanery. The opportunist in me saw Bat Lake as the perfect vehicle to vie for a return to Cooper's old stomping ground in Sydney Dance Company's preprofessional course, as a choreographer for their annual end of year presentation, or as part of the company's annual New Breed season featuring emergent choreographers.



An intimate, behind the scenes memoir of Meryl Tankard's career, in conversation with author and podcaster, Caroline Baum, illustrated by long term collaborator, Régis Lansac OAM. Meryl Tankard, undoubtedly one of Australia's leading contemporary artists, is internationally acclaimed for the "emotional punch packed into her inventive choreography". Having leapt to fame in Europe with Pina Bausch and the radical German Wuppertaler Tanztheater, as one of Bausch's leading performers, Tankard returned to Australia to create a dance aesthetic all her own. Tankard has had a prolific career as a performer, choreographer and director, with an inspiring canon of work that has been a seminal influence in the development of Australian contemporary dance and dance theatre.

This was a fundraising event with proceeds going to FORM Dance Projects, making dance happen.
